TALK OVERVIEWS

Who is God?

Isaiah 55:6-11 and Psalm 102:25-28

How does God reveal himself? Can we actually know God and what does thinking about God do for our life? In this talk we will explore 3 attributes of God (Aseity, Immutability and Omniscience) with a eye to see how comforting and safe it is to know that God is independent from creation, but uses creation to relate to us and show us more of himself.

God, 3 In 1

Deuteronomy 6:4-5 and Hebrews 1:1-3

Trinity is more than just the name of our church! It's a way to describe God as one, but 3 persons. Confused? It can be. In this talk we will explore the unity of God, how he interacts with creation and us in different ways, but always as one God and why having a solid grasp on the Trinity answer many questions about God and how to relate to him in our daily life.

Why Is The Old Testament So Violent?

Deuteronomy 18:9-13, Joshua 11:15-23 and Hebrews 4:8-13

Violence is a tragic aspect of human life and not God's intent for us. But, it doesn't take long to see violence permeating the Biblical story – from Cain and Abel, to the land conquest, Jesus' death and then the wrath of God being poured out in Revelation 14. So, what do we make of all this? More over, we often find violence associated with the land conquest narratives in the book of Joshua. This raises a heap of questions about the people groups living in the land, why God wants them take it over though a military campaign and how this fits with the rest of the Bible. As we walk though these big issues, we will end up in Hebrews 4 and how the ultimate goal that the land points to – rest and the removal of idols that would trip up God's people – is seen in Jesus' death, his promised renewal of heaven and earth and that the only military tools Christians have, is the word of God, the sword, as we confront our own evil and injustice with compassion, prayer, the gospel and kindness.

The God Who Doesn't Sleep

1 King 19:1-9 and Psalm 127:1-2

Have you ever though about what God can't do? It's often a helpful way to understand God's character. For example, God can't change, lie, deny himself, sin, be lonely, suffer, die and sleep. Like with most things, Christianity is the invitation to trust and walk with God in all of life – even sleep. And, just as a Christian may be anxious, worried, distracted, forgetful and sinful at times, so too, we will struggle to sleep. But, none of those other things imply that God isn't good or with us. So too, this Christianity isn't a magical sleeping pill. Rather, sleep is redeemed as something

anxious or fearful or lacking or disruptive, but as something that is now an extension of grace and a chance to walk into sleep trusting God as we do.
